the library

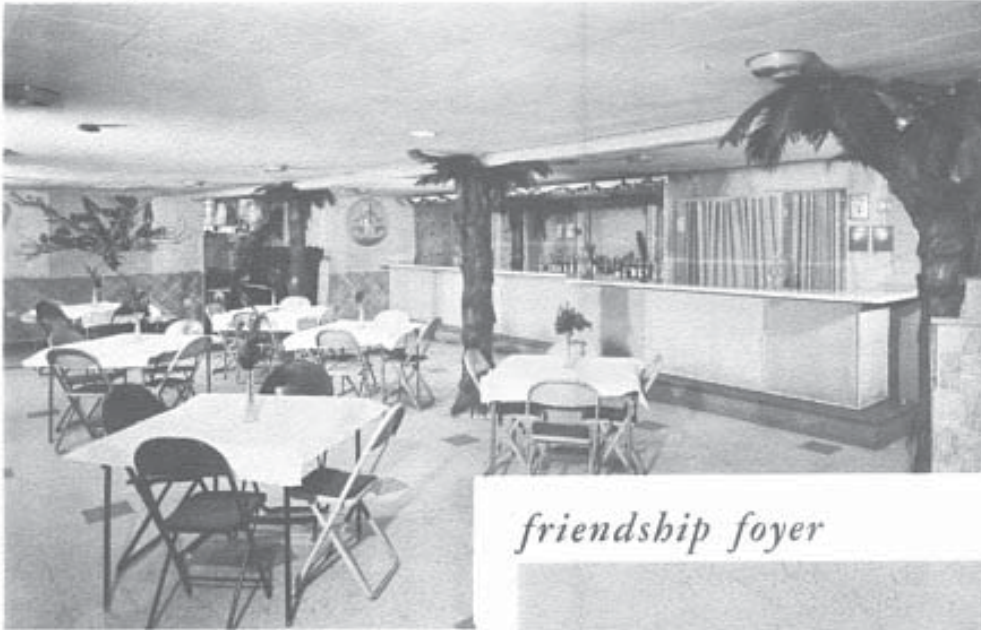


the den
