For the 126th time, Chicago's Polonia and its supporters celebrated Poland's Constitution of 1791, the first democratic constitution in Europe, patterned after our own Constitution. On a beautiful Saturday afternoon, over 100 units participated in the Parade, spanning many generations—from the veter-

ans to the children. It was so heart-warming to see so many children and youth marching, from the Saturday schools, dance ensembles, Harcerstwo, and other youth groups, enthusiastically showing their pride in the White and Red, which the veterans so gallantly fought to defend.

What was sadly missing was spectators. I would venture to say that over 90% of those watching were Polish, and many of those were participants or their families. I would further venture that there were more participants than spectators. Where was everyone? The Parade is our annual display of our pride and our strength. But, what good is that if there is no one to show it to? We Poles are the fifth largest ethnic group in the state of Illinois. There should have been thousands of us lining Columbus Drive cheering on the marchers and showing our strength. Sadly, the only people we were impressing were ourselves.

Similarly, there was a noticeable lack of non-Polish units. It used to be that the JROTC units of many Chicago high schools participated with a marching band.

2ND PLACE ESSAY - KRISTIAN ZADLO

Totus Tuus

As silence engulfed the Earth, many stood on their toes and others whispered to each other waiting for history to be written. Within moments, light white smoke billowed from the shingled tops of the Sistine Chapel. People in Saint Peter's Square rejoiced and excitingly embraced each other as bells rang in the background. Like dominoes falling to form a chain-reaction, families informed families across the world. A cacophony of sounds could be heard from our planet as the papal conclave elected Karol J. Wojtyła from Poland as the next Pope and leader of the Roman Catholic Church. After over four and a half centuries of Italian Popes, Pope and later Saint John Paul II would go on to perform many miracles and ultimately help unify the world after nearly a century of troubled disagreements. With the baptism of Prince Mieszko I in 966 AD, the significance of Pope Saint John Paul II clearly represents the impact of over a thousand years of Catholic history in the lives of Poles and Polish-Americans. For over a millennium, Catholicism has successfully guided our hopes and dreams and ultimately shaped us to who we are today. Despite any hardship, Polish descendants, including myself, have always looked up to our faith for guidance, enlightenment, and universal support.

Catholic worship has had an immense impact on Polish landscape and history. About ninety percent of Poles practice Catholicism while roughly ninety-eight percent follow some branch of Christianity. With the evident popularity of the Catholic and Christian faith in Poland, around every-other turn in any major city one can find a church. Alongside the many churches that provide individuals with a holy retreat of their own, Poland houses the renowned monastery of Jasna Góra in Częstochowa, which holds a painting of Black Madonna. Many Polish citizens credit the holy painting of Black Madonna with safeguarding the nation from Swedish invasion in 1655. Hence, she received the title as the Protectress of Poland. Undoubtedly, Christianity weaves itself throughout Polish history. For example, the Battle of Vienna also represents Poland's most successful attempt to resist Turkish invasion and Muslim rule in Europe.

Similarly, the massive turn to Catholicism for guidance helped many resist communist rule by the Soviet Union. In fact, Poles often credit Saint John Paul II as the inspiration in the charge against communism. Catholicism in Poland distinguishes the nation as a powerful identity relative to its Lutheran counterparts to the east and Orthodox counterparts to the west. In times of trouble, the nation could quickly find unity in its faith and receive support in decision making.

With citizens bound by patriotism and a common religion, Poland was always able to bounce back, tackle problems, and support many communities. The amount of respect and desire to practice Catholicism in Poland shouldn't go without notice. In every moment in Polish history, Catholicism has shaped its landscape and history to what it is today, underlining the importance for individuals to find a common path, collective wisdom, and community among each other.

Personally, I could always turn to Catholicism as a place for help. Fortunately, I have been baptized, received Holy Communion, and was confirmed under the Roman Catholic Church. I attended religious education early in my life, became an altar server, and currently continue to attend masses when appropriate. Thus, with my parents' initial guidance into the Catholic Church, I grew to respect my faith. My connection to my faith only strengthened my involvement in the Polish Scouting Organization, which emphasized understanding of Polish heritage by underlining that scouts should serve God and Poland. Almost always, the organization aims to form troops under the supervision of a Polish church and school. By doing so, the church provides a home of communal support for the non-for-profit organization. In turn, the organization provides community service, leadership, and skill-building activities for participating scouts in that home. As someone devoted to the Polish Scouting Organization, the possibilities and the support of the church provide extremely beneficial in aspects such as organizing events or helping with financial limitations. Alongside my respect for my faith and involvement in the organization, Catholicism has shaped my desire to help people while also being the place I can search for help. I credit my faith for giving me clear direction in my daily life. The notion that I could find support in God and family and that I could help others to strengthen their faith buds from my personal connection to the Roman Catholic Church.

Polish descendants like myself rely on the guidance, enlightenment, and support we receive from the Roman Catholic Church. In fact, Polish history speaks for itself as evident by the various moments Poland turned to religion for identity. Similarly, Catholicism lends support to me and teaches how to give support to my brethren. Ultimately, Catholicism spreads this idea that people should always help each other. Many know Saint Pope John Paul II for the tremendous efforts he put into forgiving and uniting people across the globe. Hence, as someone Polish it is important to understand that we are also here for one another. As catechized by Saint Pope John Paul II, we should be "Totus Tuus" or "Totally Yours."



Zdzisław Beksiński A Tale Told by Shadows



From June 9 to September 5, the Polish Museum of America in Chicago is hosting an exhibit of the paintings,

drawings, avant-garde photographs and documentary films of Zdzisław Beksiński, one of the leading figures in Polish contemporary art. Zdzisław Beksiński (1929-2005) is known for his nonconformity and the freedom in which he shaped and distorted reality in his works.

Beksiński's paintings will also be presented in virtual reality, allowing visitors to take a journey inside his painting. Art presented at the exhibition is from the collection of the Historical Museum in Sanok, Poland.

The exhibition in Chicago will be a unique historical event. Although Zdzisław Beksiński's works are in the private collection of Roman Polanski, Chip Joslin, Beata Tyszkiewicz, Jerzy Skolimowski and Donald Sutherland, their exhibition in the Polish Museum will be the first time they are presented in the United States.
