Frank Gondela, a 58-Year Member of the Chicago Society

Francis M. "Frank" Gondela, one of the Chicago Society's longest-tenured members, passed away on Saturday, September 16 at the age of 96. A resident of Norridge, he had been a member of the Society for 58 years. Born on January 13, 1927, the son of Frank and Irene Gondela, he was the owner and president of Service Stamp Works in Chicago for over 50 years. He graduated from Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa, where he ran hurdles in the Drake Relays. A World War II veteran, Frank served in the U.S. Army Air Corps, and was stationed in the Philippines. In retirement, he volunteered for many years at the Hines VA Hospital. He was also a longtime barbershop quartet singer, and a member of SPEBSQSA, an organization for barbershop singers.

He is survived by his wife of 61 years, Beverly (nee Morgan); a son, Craig M. (Cynthia) Gondela; two daughters, Barbara L. and Denise M. (Jeffrey) Diessel-Weck; six grandchildren—Jackson Gondela-Haack, Andrew and Grace Gondela, Liam and Bergan Weck, and Kristoffel Diessel. He was also the favorite uncle of Jeffrey, Brandon and Brooke. He was preceded in death by a brother-in-law, Richard (Joan) Morgan.

Visitation was held Friday, Oct. 13 at St. Eugene/Queen of Peace Church, 7958 W. Foster Ave., Chicago, followed by a funeral Mass and interment at St. Adalbert Cemetery, Niles, with military honors—a flag ceremony, bugler and 21-gun salute. Lucille Gutowski, Wife of Longtime Chicago Society Member

Lucille D. (nee Remus) Gutowski, 90, of Norridge, for 66 years the wife of longtime Chicago Society member Donald Gutowski, passed away on Wednesday, September 20, 2023. Born on May 7, 1933, she was a graduate of St. Stanislaus Elementary School, Notre Dame High School and DePaul University, where she was president of the Alpha Omega sorority. She helped her husband build the family business, Consolidated Tool Manufacturers, which they owned for over 25 years. She was also an active volunteer in the community, including at Divine Savior Parish and at her four daughters' schools; and was a founding member of the Norridge Theatre Guild. She also served as president of the Legion of Young Polish Women, worked with the Copernicus Foundation, and was a supporter of the Polish Museum of America.

In addition to her husband, she is survived by daughters Deann (James) Schlobohm, Laura (Bob) Davis, Ruth (Scott) Mueller and Mary (Stan) Hazzard; 10 grandchildren—Victoria (Matt) Smith; Peter (Alejandra) Davis; Stephanie and Sonja Schlobohm; Anna and Ella Mueller; and Alex, Jocelyn, Matt and Vanessa Hazzard; a great-grandaughter, Lily Smith; and her best friend since childhood, Ursula Kucharski.

Dr. Thaddeus Zamirowski: Was PNA's Medical Director

Dr. Thaddeus A. "Ted" Zamirowski Jr., a Chicago-area family physician for nearly four decades, who also served as the longtime medical director for the Polish National Alliance, passed away on Thursday, September 22, 2023 at Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge. "Dr. Zam," as he was widely known, spent his medical career at numerous locations throughout the Chicago area, including Resurrection Medical Center in Chicago, and Holy Family Hospital and the former Oakton-Maple medical office in Des Plaines.

Born in Aurora, III. in 1952, and raised in the Portage Park neighborhood on Chicago's Northwest Side, Dr. Zamirowski graduated from Loyola Academy High School in Wilmette and Loyola University in Chicago, and earmed his M.D. degree from Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine. He met his wife of 44 years, Janet (nee Grafenauer) during his residency at St. Mary of Nazareth Hospital in Chicago, where she was a nurse. They lived in Park Ridge for many years, and after his retirement in 2016, he liked to say that he "transitioned" into being a handyman, gourmet cook, babysitter and wedding planner for his family. He was also known for his storytelling, sense of humor, and love of hosting family and friends at their second home in Green Lake, Wisconsin.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by a son, Andrew; a daughter, Alexandra (Kyle) Norman; two grandchildren, Finnegan and Violet Norman; and a host of close family and friends. He was preceded in death by his parents, Thaddeus Zamirowski Sr. and Julia (nee Ralcewich); and a son, Anthony. A private "Celebration of Life" event will be held in the coming weeks. In lieu of flowers, donations to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital are appreciated. Trees are also being planted in his memory.

Chicago's Polish-Born Bishop Wypych Resigns Due to Illness

The Vatican announced on September 19 that it had accepted the resignation of Bishop Andrew Wypych, who has been an auxiliary bishop of the Archdiocese of Chicago since 2011. The Polishborn Wypych, who is 68, tendered his resignation "for health reasons," according to the archdiocese. Another auxiliary bishop, Joseph Perry, also resigned because he has reached the age of 75—when bishops are required to submit their resignations.

Blshop Wypych was Episcopal Vicar for Vicariate V of the archdiocese, which includes parts of Chicago's Southwest Side and nearby suburbs. He is also the only Polish-speaking bishop in the archdiocese. Born in Kazimierza Wielka, Poland, in 1954, he was ordained a deacon in May 1978 in Krakow by then-Cardinal Karol Wojtyla (who became Pope John Paul II five months later), and then a priest in 1979. Wypych came to Chicago in 1983, serving at St. Giles in Oak Park; and St. Ladislaus, St. Pancratius, Five Holy Martyrs, and St. Francis Borgia parishes, all in Chicago, before being named a bishop by Pope Benedict XVI. Cardinal Francis George consecrated him on August 10, 2011.

Father Marek Smolka, another Polish native, has been appointed as the interim vicar of Vicariate V by Cardinal Blase Cupich, replacing Wypych in that post. Smolka is currently pastor of St. Francis Borgia Parish, and is the Dean of Deanery IV-D and coordinator of the Polish Ministry Council in the archdiocese.

Consequently, they truly appreciate the sacrifice of each and every veteran who has left a safe and secure home to ensure the safety and freedom of others. *** Current Events *** Will the Results in Poland's Election Be Determined By "Election Tourism?"

Over 1.1 million Poles registered to vote in Poland's October 15 parliamentary elections outside their usual place of residence. That is four times more than at the last such elections in 2019, and it comes amid reports that so-called "election tourists" were choosing to cast their vote where they think it will carry the most weight.

The figure, reported by the daily "Dziennik Gazeta Prawna," based on data from the digital affairs ministry, is accurate up to October 11; however, it may have risen further by the end-of-day deadline on Thursday, October 12 to register to vote at a different polling station.

In addition to the 1.1 million who had registered to vote away from their usual place of residence, a further 294,000 had applied for a certificate allowing them to vote at any polling station. That figure is almost double the number in 2019. At least part of this increase has been attributed to "election tourism," where voters from large cities travel to smaller towns, hoping to increase the weight of their vote in close-run elections. That is because, experts note, more voters are needed to elect a single member of Parliament in large cities like Warsaw or Krakow than in smaller towns.

In addition, the currently ruling national-conservative Law and Justice party (PiS) has more support in the smaller towns. In 2019, it won between 48 and 58 percent of the vote in towns of up to 20,000 inhabitants, while in the large cities it won just 30 percent.

In the vote for the Sejm, the more powerful lower house of Parliament, Poland is divided into 41 districts. Each one elects between 7 and 20 MP's, depending on population. Since 2011, disparities between districts have widened with the migration of more people from rural to urban areas.

Based on its population, Warsaw should have 11 more MP's than it currently has, according to "Business Insider Polska" journalist Rafal Hirsch. The weight of votes in Warsaw is further reduced because all overseas votes are counted toward the city's total. This year, a record 608,000 people registered to vote abroad,

According to political scientist Jaroslaw Flis, the large number of people registered to vote outside their place of residence suggests that nationwide, the votes of such "tourists" could determine up to seven seats in the 460-seat Sejm. That could prove crucial, given that polls suggested a very close race, with uncertainty as to whether either Law and Justice or the mainstream opposition can win a majority.
