#### Save the Date—PRCUA's 150th Anniversary is October 1st

The Polish Roman Catholic Union of America will mark its 150th anniversary with a special gala event on Sunday, October 1, 2023 at Drury Lane Theatre and Events, at Roosevelt Road and Butterfield Road in Oakbrook Terrace, III. Teodor Gieryk and Rev. # "Back Home: Polish Chicago" Opening at Chicago History Museum on May 20

An exhibit spotlighting Chicago's Polish community from the mid-1800's until the present day will open at the Chicago History Museum starting on Saturday, May 20. "Back Home: Polish Chicago" will give attendees the chance to experience the journeys that Polish immigrants have taken to get to the city over the years, the ways they have established themselves in various neighborhoods, and the duality of feeling a deep connection to two places at once.

Members of the Chicago History Museum will get the chance to see a special preview of the exhibit on Wednesday, May 17 from 5:30 to 8 p.m., followed by a reception.

"Back Home: Polish Chicago" will feature more than 90 artifacts and documents, as well as more than 100 reproduced photographs, to help tell the stories of Chicago's vibrant Polish communities. Visitors will get to explore personal narratives, music and community involvement, as well as art installations from five local artists of Polish heritage. The exhibition is a collaborative effort with the Polish History Museum in Warsaw, the Polish Museum of America in Chicago, and the Loyola University Polish Studies Program.

The Chicago History Museum is located at 1601 N. Clark St. (corner of North Avenue) in the Lincoln Park neighborhood. Guided tours are available for groups of 10 or more, and admission is always free for persons who are members of the museum. ## Ladies' First: Four More Women Join Chicago Society at Our March Meeting!

Just a month after Chicago Society PNA Lodge 1450 inducted its first-ever female member, four more women were inducted at the March meeting, held at Lone Tree Manor in Niles. Officially sworn in at that meeting were: Renee A. Robinson, a daughter of the late Ro Matuszczak; Darlene Feret Czaja, wife of member Frank Czaja; Beata Baranska, wife of member Bill Sufranski; and Agnieszka Bastrzyk. They now join Marta Almodovar, sworn in at the February meeting, as full members. The men of the Chicago Society voted late in 2022 to change gender-specific language in the organization's constitution and by-laws, which had limited membership to men for over a century.

The Polish American Police Association (PAPA) will honor seven local police officers as Law Enforcement Persons of the Year, and also two Civilian Persons of the Year, at its 57th annual awards banquet on Friday, May 5 at Allegra Banquets, 5035 N. River Rd., Schiller Park. Cocktail hour starts at 6 p.m., with dinner at 7 p.m.

The Honorable Michael Chmiel, Chief Judge of McHenry County, Ill., will be the keynote speaker at the event, which is part of a week of activities throughout the Chicago area marking the celebration of Polish Constitution Day.

Police officers to be honored as Law Enforcement Persons of the Year at the banquet are: Sheriff James Mendrick of DuPage County; Sheriff Robb Tadelman of McHenry County; Chief Frank Kaminski of the Park Ridge Police Department; Chief Kevin Licko of the Lisle Police Department; Deputy Chief Chad Roszkowiak of the Libertyville Police Department; Deputy Chief Reed Foltyniewicz of the Oak Brook Police Department; and Deputy Chief Paul Klimek of the Countryside Police Department.

Also to be honored at the event as Civilian Persons of the Year are Dr. Lucja Mirowska-Kopec, president of the Alliance of Polish Clubs; and Andrzej Brach, a photographer for local Polish-American media. ## Lt. Col. Adamczyk Is Parade's Grand Marshal; 'Partnership for Peace' Is Its Theme

"The Polish American Partnership for Peace" is the official theme for the 2023 Polish Constitution Day Parade, to be held on Saturday, May 6, on Columbus Drive in downtown Chicago, with Lt. Colonel Andrew Adamczyk of Springfield, III., serving as Grand Marshal. He has served in the Army since 1995. The Vice Marshal is James Robaczewski, president of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America (and a member of the Chicago Society). The parade will highlight the 30th anniversary of a partnership between the Illinois National Guard and the military of Poland. Major General Richard R. Neely has also been chosen as a "Friend of Polonia."

Also presiding over the parade will be Marianna Mosz, a 17-year-old student at Taft High School in Chicago, who was chosen as Parade Queen from among a dozen contestants in March. She and her family live on Chicago's Northwest Side. She was also chosen as Miss Congeniality at the Queen's Pageant. Among the other contestants were first runner-up Carolina Wozniczka; second runner-up Victoria Czarnik, and Claudia Walkosz, who was chosen as Miss Photogenic. All 12 young ladies who competed at the Queen's Pageant will also be on the float at the parade on May 6.

## Officer Seija, 7 Others in K of C Police Council Receive Lifetime Achievement Awards

Chicago Police Officer Thomas Seija, president of the Polish American Police Association and a member of the Chicago Society PNA, was among eight officers who received a Lifetime Achievement in Law Enforcement Award at the 25th Annual Gala Dinner of Knights of Columbus Police Council #12173, held March 25 at Carlisle Banquets in Lombard.

The police council, named for St. Michael the Archangel, patron saint of police, is based in Chicago and has about 155 members.

## Polish Parliament Passes Resolution Denouncing Attacks on Pope St. John Paul II

WARSAW, March 9 [Reuters] — Poland's Parliament passed a resolution defending the name of the late Pope St. John Paul II, after a new book charged that he covered up sexual abuse by priests when he was the archbishop of Krakow (1964-78).

The allegations about John Paul II, the first Polish pope, aired in a documentary shown by private broadcaster TVN24, provoked fierce debate in one of Europe's most devoutly Catholic nations. Many religious conservatives condemned what they see as a left-wing plot to discredit a figure who is at the core of the nation's identity.

Politicians from the ruling Law and Justice (PiS) party proposed the resolution defending his name, which was passed 271-43 by the Sejm, the lower house of parliament. "The Sejm strongly condemns the shameful media campaign, based largely on materials of the (former) Communist apparatus of violence, whose object is the great pope, St. John Paul II, the greatest Pole in history," the resolution reads.

"We will not allow the image of a man whom the whole free world recognizes as a pillar of victory over the Evil Empire to be destroyed," it added, using the term coined by former U.S. President Ronald Reagan to describe the Soviet Union.

The head of the Polish Bishops' Conference, Archbishop Stanislaw Gadecki of Poznan, also called on "all people of good will not to destroy the common good—and the legacy of John Paul II undoubtedly belongs to this...Poles should remember about the blessing that Providence gave us through this pope," Gadecki said in his statement.

The book, titled "Maxima Culpa," written by a journalist from the Netherlands, Ekke Overbeek, and published in Polish in March, charges that John Paul II knew about sexual abuse in his archdiocese, but helped to cover it up by transferring priests from one parish to another. It draws on the archives of the former Communist Polish secret police, as well as conversations with alleged victims. Those defending the late pope question the reliability of information from the Communist secret police documents.

# Poland Remains Top Importer of Russian LPG

Poland has been by far the European Union's biggest importer of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) from Russia over the past year despite the war in Ukraine, a new report shows. Poland spent 710 million euro on Russian LPG in 2022, which was almost two-thirds of the 1.1 billion euro spent by the entire European Union. (The euro is currently about equal in value to the U.S. dollar.)

In March 2022, shortly after Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the Polish government pledged to stop all energy imports from Russia by the end of 2022. The following month, the prime minister also pledged to end LPG imports from Russia within the same time frame. But whereas coal and gas imports were ended, and oil drastically cut, LPG purchases were not reduced after the Russian invasion, but actually increased—and are continuing to do so, according to the Warsaw-based think tank Forum Energii.
