Quo Vadis

The speaker at our August meeting was Agnieszka Ptasznik, one of the organizers of the "Quo Vadis" conference which was held for the first time in Chicago on Aug. 24—26. The conference is designed to be a forum for Polish young professionals to strengthen their leadership skills, and then use those skills to strengthen Polonia. The first such forum was held in Poland as a seminar on Polish leadership with peers in Poland. Following that first conference, subsequent conferences were held in Canada, and this year is being held in Chicago..

The title of the conference "Quo Vadis" is the question "Where are we going?" The challenge of the conference, then, is to explore direction for young Americans and Canadians of Polish descent. The theme of this year's conference is "Modern Leaders: Own your own Identity." It is meant to provide a venue for young Polonians to form a network of support, to exchange ideas, and share projects. Participants will also explore the questions "What do we want to show? How are we going to show it?"

A variety of highly positioned speakers addressed the conference, both from Poland and from the United States, giving the participants background information and a number of hands-on skills, meant to improve the leadership skills of the participants, thereby giving them a greater voice in building Polonia in their home towns. When asked her definition of leadership, Ms. Ptasznik replied: "place others' needs before your own, listen, find that delicate balance, be diplomatic, be patient, be positive." At the conclusion of her talk, Ms. Ptasznik thanked The Chicago Society foundation for its generous grant to support the conference.

FROM THE ANNALS OF THE CHICAGO SOCIETY

Our organization was well nurtured under the able leadership of Bro. Frank Osuch during the four years of his term. The World War coming on and taking away so many of our brothers gave our then chairman, Brother Michal Kitkowski, many anxious members, but he built too well. And when our boys came back from the front he had the proud honor, before giving up his duties, of presenting to our community not a military organization, but a fraternal society, which out of every three members had one who was a soldier of Uncle Sam and one out of every three soldiers was an American Army Officer.

The Society built well because its original organizers saw that it has fit material to build well. It grew in membership, finance and activity and our intense interest for doing things for others as well as for ourselves became the most important reason of our existence, and through this the seven or eight hundred orphaned youngsters at St. Hedwig's Orphanage at Niles, Illinois, and the membership of the Polish Welfare Association stand in the front ranks of the Society's friends.

The ideals of the Chicago Society have spread to Detroit, Milwaukee, Buffalo, Cleveland and Grand Rapids, and will continue to grow, with the moral support of the agencies that should be most anxious and solicitous of its growth. The Detroit Society, although functioning only a few years, set a splendid example during the latter part of 1924 and the first part of 1925 in subscribing \$25,000 for its Scholarship and Education Fund. This compels every town where our societies exist to set a new and much higher mark on its activity and endeavor. And so we, in order to fulfill the obligation of our altruistic work, are giving our entire membership the privilege of working to make the Polish Day Festival, which is our endeavor this year and maybe the endeavor for the entire season of our community in the future, as definite success.

Let us continue to build well as an inspiration for others to build, and especially for those who lay the solid, unselfish, high idealed foundation to build upon. We have yet so much to do in order to impress properly on all Americans of our community that our people's morals are high, their endeavors are right, and aspirations not selfish, but that they are simply looking for a place under the sun to show the best that is in them. We are trying to build well.

CHICAGO SOCIETY ON THE AIR


President **Frank Czaja** and Executive VP **Don Gutowski** were interviewed at WCEV radio station (1450 AM) by Lucyna

2013 ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

The Nominating Committee for the Chicago Society of the PNA's election of 2013 officers and directors has been chosen and approved. The Nominating Committee is composed of: chairman Walter Piecewicz, Andrew Zapalski, Mario Mikoda, Marian Skawski, Zenon Kurdziel; alternates: Jim Kolak and Raymond Golonia. If anyone is interested in running for a position on the board, either as an officer or director-at-large, please contact the Chairman or another member of nominating committee to find out the procedure and qualifications. You must contact them as soon as possible because they will announce the slate at the October meeting.

RULES FOR VOTING AND RUNNING FOR OFFICE IF NOT SLATED

The Chairman of the Nominating Committee informs members that any member may run against a slated candidate for a particular office. The rules and procedures for doing such are stated in the Constitution, Article VII: Election of Officers and Directors.

The Nominating Committee shall select at least one candidate for each elective position who shall be required to sign an acceptance of nomination. At the October meeting, the chairman of the Nominating Committee will announce the slate of candidates that has been selected.

At the regular meeting in October the Nominating Committee shall accept for nomination such additional lists of candidates for the respective offices as may be submitted by the petitions of ten or more members, provided however that the signed acceptance of each candidate is attached to each such petition. The adjournment of the meeting shall close the nominations in the absence of a motion for that purpose. Immediately thereafter, the nominating committee shall submit a list containing all of the names of the candidates to the Recording Secretary who shall cause the publicizing of such list to all members in good standing at least ten days prior to the date of the November election meeting.

The President shall appoint five Judges of Election, if necessary, who shall prepare a ballot, have charge of the polls of election, canvass the votes and certify the results to the Recording Secretary. Only members in good standing shall be eligible to be elected, to sign petitions or to vote. No member admitted to membership in the Society within five days of election shall be eligible to vote at the election.

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POLISH TRADITIONS IN SEPTEMBER "PLON NIESIEMY, PLON"

Dożynki (Harvest Festival) has been practiced throughout Poland for centuries, even to this day. This rite was originally related to the cult of plants and trees, later with agriculture. As farming manors prospered in the sixteenth century *dożynki* were held at the estates. These festivals were held for farmhands and employees as a reward for the work done with the harvest.

Traditionally, *dożynki* were celebrated on the first day of autumn and were dedicated to the current year's harvest in thanking the gods for the harvest, and asking for even better the following year. They were a relic of ancient magical practices, to ensure good harvest for the coming year

The wieniec (wreath) is a focal point of the celebrations: The farmhands make a wreath of grain from the field, with bunches of red rowanberries (jarzębina), nuts, fruits, flowers and colored ribbons. Harvest wreaths had the shape of a large crown. The wreath was also called plon (yield) because it embodied all that was harvested. The przodownica (the oldest female harvester) carried it on her head or in her outstretched hands, sometimes with the help of laborers and other reapers. Behind the



procession were festively dressed reapers, carrying on their shoulders cleaned scythes and sickles decorated with flowers. The *wieniec* was carried to the church to be blessed, and then in a grand procession was carried to the court or to the house of the host of the festival. She presented the wreath to the squire who hung it up in a place of honor in his home. He then poured himself and the *przodownik* (the oldest male harvester) a glass of vodka and toasted the entire company. The squire then invited all present to a feast. The *wieniec* was stored in the barn for the next year, for the next planting.

Long tables were set up in the squire's front yard. The priest blessed the food and the feasting would begin. Although the squire and his family and household staff joined the harvesters at the feast, the food was traditional, hearty peasant fare. This might include rye bread (baked from the newly milled grain), cold roast bacon, head cheese, jellied pig's feet, *kiszka*, cabbage and sausage, noodles and cheese, buckwheat pie, plus brined dill pickles, tomatoes and cucumbers in sour cream. Beer was served to wash it all down. A *kołacz* (round yeast-raised cake) or *placek* (coffee cake) and fresh fruit (cherries, apples, pears, plums) set out in bowls were typical desserts. After the meal, the squire dances the first dance with the *przodownica*, and his wife dances with the *przodownik*. Afterwards all are invited to join in the merriment.

In the late nineteenth century, following the model of the harvest festival of the manor houses, rich farmers organized their own *dożynki* for their household, family, and farmhands. Currently, this largest traditional holiday of the season, *dożynki* are held on a Sunday sometime after the harvest.

Did you know? September in Polish is *wrzeszień*, from the word *wrzós* (heather) which blooms in September.

Gdy wrzesień bez deszczów będzie, w zimie wiatrów pełno wszędzie. (If there is no rain in September, there will be plenty of wind in the winter.)
